MFAH's Grand Gala Ball has successful evening

S the stock market was tanking last week, there was at least one bright spot on the economic horizon - the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, brought in \$1.3 million Friday night with its

The Silver Ball: Celebrating 25 Years of Excellence honored the museum's most recent board chairs — Isaac Arnold Jr., Alfred C. Glassell Jr., Cornelia Long and Isabel Wilson and spotlighted the tenure of museum director Peter Marzio. It was a highly respected coterie that eased any potential fundraising strife.

But the current economic But the current economic crunch was not far from peo-ple's minds. Asked to reflect on his 26 years at the museum, Marzio said, "I feel like I've gone full circle. I started with a crisis. We came in 1982 with the oil crisis, and now we have the financial crisis."

In the interim, the museum has prospered with an endow-ment that had grown from \$20 million to \$1 billion and an accu mulation of more than 40,000 new works. Those figures were shared with the black-tie crowd of 425 by Ann Bookout, whom Marzio described as "the magician who made all of this (the gala) possible."

The ravishing evening was a silver celebration with beaded silver cloths on tables centered with explosive topiaries of white flowers by **John Friedman**. A number of ladies donned silver gowns, including the gala chair, who wore a shimmering design by Carolina Herrera. Highlight of the décor was

the ever-changing projection of artworks (enlarged dozens of times) acquired in the past quarter-century. It prompted Marzio to note, "What I like Marzio to note, "What I like about this evening is that it fo cuses on the art."
